2013 Coral Sea Assoc. Scholarship Winning Essay.

Armed forces not only defend our nation, but serve as an example of the standards that are held within our borders. In the United States, a strong military is needed in order to fulfill the international positions and commitments that it has made to other nations. Strong armed forces are instrumental in protecting international sovereignty and commerce, supporting alliances such as NATO, and helping to combat global terrorism. Yet, the United States armed forces were not created just for preserving peace in the world, they were created to protect America. The United States military serves as our defense against hostile nations, ensuring the safety of the people of the United States every day. Even during times of peace, the United States military defends the nation by simply existing as a deterrent to any other country that wishes to threaten us. The strength of our armed forces is especially important because it most accurately reflects the United States as the strong and united nation that it is.

After the Revolutionary War the strength of the United States military was greatly diminished due to the fact that the war had ended and a strong military was no longer necessary. It was also at this time that France no longer had to defend American ships from being attacked, leaving the United States in charge of its own protection. The Barbary Pirates took advantage of the United States' weak position and began to capture hostages and demand ransoms. Tired of paying ransoms, Jefferson decided to build up a navy. "It will be more easy to raise ships and men to fight these pirates into reason, than money to bribe them." Jefferson once wrote. When Jefferson became president, this is exactly what he did. Using the force of the United States Navy, Jefferson finally was able to create peaceful relations with the Barbary Pirates. Creating a strong military helped the United States to defeat the Barbary Pirates and protect international commerce and American citizen's lives.

Throughout history, weakened militaries have been the cause of many nations' downfalls. On August 2, 1990, Iraq, which at the time had the world's fourth largest standing

military, invaded the country of Kuwait. Due to the small and relatively weak military force that Kuwait maintained, much of the equipment that the military possessed was destroyed by the Iraqis. It was this inability to defend the nation, due to small numbers and depleted equipment supply, which allowed Iraq to take over Kuwait in just two days. Within several months, the nations of the world spoke up, demanding that Iraq leave Kuwait by January 15, 1991. The U.S. and many other countries helped to expel Iraq from Kuwait in an efficient manner. Kuwait's small military, largely depleted after the invasion, stood no chance of trying to regain power, and relied on the assistance of other countries' armed forces that were greater in strength. The power and force of the other nations showed the importance of military strength, not just in defense of one's own country, but other countries as well.

Although the U.S. was in the depths of the Great Depression, the aggressive actions of Germany caused the United States to create the Lend Lease Program to provide older ships and equipment to Great Britain in the early stages of World War II. This program assisted the allied side, which the United States would later join. When the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor in 1941, the United States was largely unprepared to enter war. Yet, the United States was able to quickly strengthen its military. The alliances that the United States had formed with other countries allowed the allies to win World War II. A strong military enables the United States to form strategic agreements with other nations in order to better protect our nation.

Terrorism has become a growing problem, not just in the United States, but throughout the world, as well. Today, the multitude of ways to travel, as well as unsecured international borders, have allowed terrorists to enter countries all over the world. Technology continues to advance, allowing the destruction caused by terrorists to increase even more. Terrorism in itself is meant to cause fear within members of a nation, making a strong military force a necessity, in order to provide people with a feeling of safety within their own

homes. Terrorism is also the cause of lost lives, equipment, property, and assets, placing a heavy financial burden on those who must replace and rebuild what is lost. With threats on the United States quality of life and property, it is important that the United States Armed Forces remain strong in order to combat this problem of global terrorism. Keeping our armed forces strong is necessary, not just for

the survival of the United States as a nation but for the other nations that depend on the United States as well. A strong military keeps America safe from foreign enemies, whether they are terrorists or the opposing force in battle. Most importantly, the strength of the United States armed forces portrays to other countries the strength of the United States as a nation and keeps the citizens of America safe from harm.

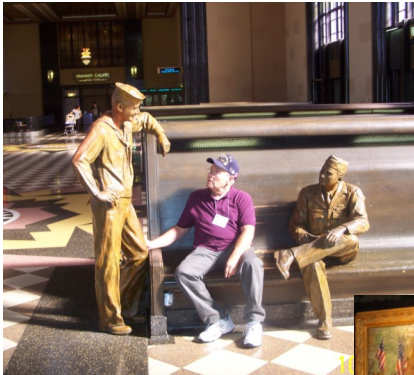

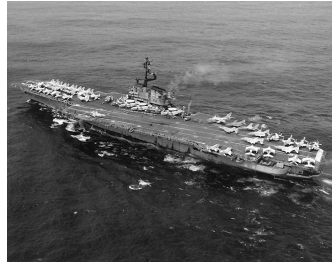

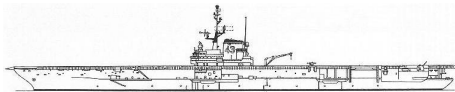
